Celebrating Half the Sky Australia's Official Launch!

In June and July, hundreds of Half the Sky Australia supporters joined us in Melbourne and Sydney to celebrate our official launch, which was five years in the making!

Though Half the Sky Australia Limited was founded in 2009, it was only in 2014 that we completed our long endeavour to gain deductible gift recipient (DGR) status that is so vital for our fundraising activities in Australia. We thought that milestone warranted our two official launch celebrations. And we're also thrilled to report that it warranted a congratulatory message from Prime Minister, The Hon Tony Abbott MP, who was also kindly represented at our Sydney party by Senator The Hon Marise Payne, Minister for Human Services.

Guy Russo, global President of Half the Sky Foundation and Managing Director of Kmart Australia, introduced our chief executive officer, Deanne Bevan, who helped bring Half the Sky to Australia in 2009 and oversaw its long legal and tax status efforts. Deanne hosted the event as MC and warmly thanked both old friends and new for turning out in such tremendous support.

Guest speakers included Kylie Kwong, our Honorary Patron and much-adored



Australian chef, author and restaurateur, who explained that her connection with Half the Sky Australia's great cause is due in part to her Chinese heritage and in part her desire to "make the world a better place."

Half the Sky's Zhang Zhirong, who helped establish US Half the Sky Foundation in China with Jenny Bowen in 1998, offered her moving, heartfelt thanks to all of Half the Sky's supporters in Australia. ZZ's account of conditions facing orphaned children in China helped many understand how so many remain at risk despite econmic advances in parts of a vast nation.

When it was her turn, Half the Sky's Founder and CEO Jenny Bowen, also author of a new memoir *Wish You Happy Forever*, mesmerised the crowd with stories about the hurdles (and blessings!) she faced while working with the Chinese government to re-imagine its child welfare system.

Jenny told of her incredible personal journey that began with adopting two-yearold Maya from a Chinese orphanage which resulted in the founding of an enterprise that would span more than 17 years and ultimately change the lives of hundreds of thousands of disadvantaged children – an inspiring enterprise that continues today with the generous help of supporters all over the world.

In that regard, our launch events gave us a marvellous opportunity to say thank you to Half the Sky Australia's wonderfully generous community, including all those who made the evenings possible: our honorary patrons PwC and Gilbert + Tobin Lawyers whose offices hosted our events in Melbourne and Sydney respectively; Kmart Australia; Jack Morton Worldwide, Canturi Jewels, the BWM Group and, of course, our wonderful Board Members.

We trust that the milestone we celebrated in Melbourne and Sydney this year marks a new era for Half the Sky Australia, an era that will enable us to grow our supporter base in this country and expand our crucial development work in China for the benefit of its most vulnerable children.

Half the Sky Foundation Australia Operating Report, 2013/14

Half The Sky Australia (HTSA) is a non-profit, non-government, public company limited by guarantee registered in Victoria. It is a community-based organization led by its elected board of directors, governed by its constitution and accountable to its members. It currently has its registered office (and will have a new Development staffer) in Sydney, as well as an office in Melbourne staffed by its Chief Executive Officer and other volunteers.

Supporters and members of HTSA are those with an interest in the nurture, education and healthy future of orphaned and disadvantaged children in China and include Half the Sky Foundation (HTS), a non-profit, non-government, registered charity in the USA. HTSA and HTS are both entities within the global Half the Sky Network that also includes China, Hong Kong, Canada and the United Kingdom.

Since incorporation in Australia in 2009, the focus of HTSA has been to establish effective Australian operations including good corporate governance policies and procedures, the creation of a HTSA website (http://www.halfthesky.org.au), expansion of the Australian supporter base, promotion of HTSA membership (at the time of publication there are more than 130 registered members) development of communications with members, initial fundraising efforts, and the establishment of an initial overseas development project in China, our Changsha Project, which commenced in 2011 (and is covered in further detail in this report and on the HTSA website at http://halfthesky.org.au/en/node/1507).

HTSA has also sought and been granted authority in all states and territories (except NT where there is no requirement) to undertake public fundraising activities. It has also launched a national cause page with Go-Fundraise Ltd to encourage and facilitate online volunteer fundraising in the Australian community.

Since incorporation, HTSA has also been vitally concerned with obtaining Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status, considered by the HTSA board (and widely in the non-profit sector) as vital to effective fundraising efforts in Australia. It was therefore tremendous to finally receive advice from the the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) that it had granted endorsement to Half the Sky Foundation Australia Limited as a deductible gift recipient in March 2014.

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On receipt of such great news, HTSA's Board immediately turned efforts toward official "Launch" events in mid 2014 in Melbourne and Sydney, which were attended by hundreds of new friends and old in a fabulous show of support and vote of confidence in HTSA's future (see more about Launch activities in this report and on the HTSA website).

Prior to DGR status, HTSA's fundraising efforts were primarily related to existing supporters, members, directors and friends of HTSA. Outreach within these networks has resulted in sufficient funding to establish and (just) operate HTSA but not to

substantially grow the enterprise. With DGR status, however, HTSA is now positioned to begin expanding its outreach and fundraising efforts in earnest.

Total revenue jumped to \$893,850 in 2013/14 as shown in the audited financial statements in this report due to a small number of very large gifts post DGR endorsement as well as a fundraising appeal around the official HTSA Launch events held mid 2014. For the period, 95% of income came from private donors (including private foundations), with 5% from corporate and small business supporters. 92% of all expenditure was directed to HTSA's development project at Changsha.



In this Annual Report further detail is provided about HTSA's Changsha Project in partnership with HTSF. Since the project began in 2011, HTSA has been actively engaged in ongoing management, closely monitoring and evaluating progress via regular narrative and photographic reports and ongoing communication with HTSF. HTSA directors have also visited the site on multiple occasions, met with institution directors, trainers, staff and children, and are delighted with the demonstrative positive impact on orphaned children and their care-giving communities. In particular, Rainbow Training efforts from the provincial model centre and training base at Changsha continues to provide the greatest hope for thousands of at-risk children throughout the Hunan province.

In efforts to keep members and supporters informed about HTSA activities, annual general members' meeting minutes, audited financial statements as well as Changsha project reports are published on the HTSA website (www.halfthesky.org.au) and available for inspection at HTSA's registered office in Sydney. These materials may be downloaded from the website, or emailed or sent by post on request (mail to:deanne@halfthesky.org.au).

Directors meet on a regular basis to oversee all the activities of HTSA. The board comprises an Honorary Treasurer and an Audit and Finance Committee to oversee all financial transactions and financial reporting and a Chief Executive Officer to manage and report on daily operations.

HTSA is grateful to all those tremendous supporters who make its work possible especially erstwhile members, directors, donors and volunteers; Half the Sky Foundation Founder & CEO, Jenny Bowen and her incredible staff; Gilbert + Tobin Lawyers, Sydney; and Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer, China; all have generously dedicated themselves to the children. In addition, in this our 'official launch year', we extend our heart-felt thanks to PwC, Gilbert + Tobin once again, Kylie Kwong, Canturi Jewels, BWM Dentsu, Jack Morton Worldwide and Kmart Australia, without whom our launch might not have taken off!

We thank every one of our generous donors and are proud that we use your donations wisely. Ninety-two cents of every dollar spent this fiscal year went directly to HTSA's Changsha project of model programs and caregiver training to benefit orphaned children in Hunan Province.

The Changsha Project Update

When Tingting joined Half the Sky's infant programme in Changsha, it didn't take her long to come out of her shy, fearful shell. Soon she was nestling happily in her nanny's arms and displaying her mischievous streak by intentionally putting her shoes on the wrong feet. When she caught her nanny's eye, she would giggle uproariously at her joke, and adeptly move her shoes to the correct feet.

Then Tingting started Half the Sky's preschool. At first Tingting missed her nanny, but soon reveled in the support she

received from her teacher, joined (loudly) in the children's singing circles and started displaying a penchant for picking out her own very colorful outfits.

But Tingting was most proud when she joined Half the Sky's family village programme and finally had a mum and dad of her own.Her dad taught her to walk, her mum taught her she could learn to play the flute despite a congenital hand deformity, and Tingting started introducing herself confidently: "My last name is Long and my first name is Tingting. I am a three-year-old girl from the Changsha welfare institution. I have a mom, a dad, a grandma, and sisters.

TingTing is one of 78 children who have benefited from HTSA's support of Half the Sky's four model programmes at the Changsha SWI Model Children's Centre and Training Facility this year. Because Changsha is also a key centre for the Rainbow Programme, a joint government-NGO national training initiative, the impact of HTSA's Changsha Project expands beyond the Model Centre and those 78 children. From her base in Changsha, Child



Development Expert, Wang Yanhong, has travelled throughout Hunan province to train 568 caregivers and administrators who provide care for 2,800 institutionalized children.

During these trainings, Wang Yanhong stresses the simple but profound truth that is at the heart of all Half the Sky programmes: children need a nurturing adult in their life to teach them how to love and be loved. To inspire trainees to start Half the Sky-inspired programmes of their own, Wang Yanhong tells stories about young children like Tingting who have blossomed when they receive that nurturing and she teaches that older children like Hui can benefit as well.

When Hui joined Half the Sky's youth programme in Changsha at the age of 16, she met with her Half the Sky mentor grudgingly and stayed away from the other children, preferring to stay alone in a corner. But eventually Hui started not only participating in group activities but also designing and leading activities for younger children.

When asked how she had become such a confident leader, Hui's answer was simple and definitive: "my mentor."

Thanks to HTSA's Changsha Project, Hui's mentor and Tingting's nanny, teacher, mom and dad are all providing the care that loving families take for granted, the kind of care that transforms the lives of China's once forgotten children.



What Half the Sky Means for the Children — Babies and Their Nannies

An Unbreakable Bond

When Bosheng first entered the Infant Nurture Program, he held back when his nanny tried to play with him. Undaunted, Nanny Li Hongyan took him in her arms and made him feel secure.

When they played together, his giggles filled the activity room. Bosheng loved books so Nanny Li often read to him. At the end of each story, Bosheng would draw a picture and give it to Nanny Li. "Wow, you did a great job!" said Nanny Li, and Bosheng would beam with pride!

Nanny Li has recorded details of Bosheng's life and progress in



his Memory Book. Bosheng loves to look at his book and listens carefully to his nanny when she tells him stories about himself. One day, Bosheng compared the footprints and fingerprints in the book to his real hands. "My hands got bigger!" he told her. "My baby, you have grown!" she said.

Bosheng is going to be adopted soon, so he and his nanny do not have much time left together. Nanny Li knows that having a permanent family is best for Bosheng, but it is so hard to let him go. For now, she makes sure to hold Bosheng in her arms as much as she can so he knows that she will always love him.

What Half the Sky Means for the Children - Preschoolers & Their Teachers

In Bingbing's Hands

I met Bingbing the day she started preschool. All the other children gathered around her and wanted to shake hands with her. But she hid her hands behind her back and looked like she wanted to cry. She was born with cleft hands.

At first, Bingbing would not participate in the activities, but I stayed beside her. One day, when the children were doing an art project, I put a small bowl of glue near her and asked her: "What does it feel like?" She touched the glue and drew her hand back quickly. "Is it sticky?" I asked. She smiled and nodded.

After that, Bingbing started to use her hands. With practice, she became more and more dexterous. She learned to pick up, hold and manipulate objects, and even draw using a marker.

When Bingbing first started learning to write, she had trouble holding a pencil. She wrote and erased, wrote and erased, again and again. "I can write," she kept telling herself, "I can write." Finally, she made a beautiful character. She smiled and jumped for joy. All her classmates applauded.

Bingbing, I am so proud of you. Although you have experienced many storms, you are like a beautiful rainbow. I will be supportive of you forever.

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What Half the Sky Means for the Children - Youth and Their Mentors

I Am So Happy To Go To School

My name is Tao. I am 13 years old and I am deaf. I lived with a foster family in the countryside until I was 10 but then I had to return to the institution.

When I first arrived, I was eager to fit into this new place and make new friends but I had trouble. I wanted to greet everyone but didn't know how to speak so instead, I patted them on the shoulder. I also didn't know how to express that I wanted to play or share a toy so I often hid toys that I wanted to play with. The other children did not like playing with me. I felt sad and lonely.



One of my teachers noticed that I was quiet and always alone, so she helped me. She showed me how to correctly greet others and express myself when I needed or wanted something. Slowly, the other children began to play with me. I also started taking handicraft lessons and started learning sign language through Half the Sky's Youth Services Program.

I am so proud of myself and much more confident. Recently my teacher told me



that I will be going to public school with my friends soon, to learn in a real classroom. I am so happy!

Half the Sky's trained mentors are a constant presence in young people's lives, providing guidance and hugs. With this support, young people growing up in institutions learn that it's all right to have the same big dreams as other children... and to go after them.

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Half the Sky-trained foster parents create loving, permanent families for up to 4 children with special needs who otherwise would likely spend their lives in institutions. Finally, these children have a mom and dad of their own.

Love is Thicker Than Blood

Shanshan's parents became Half the Sky foster parents when she was only sixteen years old. No longer an only child, Shanshan, as a teenager, had to learn to share her parent's love.

After a period of adjustment, Shanshan became supportive of her parent's new work and worked on forging a relationship with her three new siblings. Eventually, Shanshan's newly expanded family influenced her career choice she chose orthopedics as her major at a vocational school, became interested in taking care of children with special needs, and started volunteering at the rehabilitation center at the orphanage after graduation. "I realized there were so many children who needed help."

One summer day two years ago, Shanshan's dad rushed out in heavy rain to buy rain coats for all his children. He wanted to make sure they would have them for school the next day. While he was running that errand, he died of a brain hemorrhage. Shanshan, her mom, and her siblings were devastated by his sudden death. He was a gentle man who loved every one of his children.

Shanshan now helps her mom take care of her brother and two sisters on the weekends. They have become very close and Shanshan has learned that love is thicker than blood: "We are a big family. They are my brother and sisters. My father would be so happy if he could see how close we have become."

(c) Principal activities

The principal activities of Half the Sky Foundation Australia Limited during the financial year were to further establish its local operations, membership and support base in Australia and the ongoing operation of its initial joint development project in China to directly benefit orphaned and disadvantaged children living in institutional care in Changsha and to establish a provincial training base in Hunan province.

Short term and long term objectives

HTSA's short term objectives are to:

- Implement model infant nurture, preschool and youth mentoring programs to directly benefit orphaned and disadvantaged children; programs develop emotional, social and intellectual wellbeing and provide early education and life skills vital for successful transition from institutional life into community schools, adoptive families and society;

- Implement model permanent foster family programs for the nurture, education and development of children with special needs that preclude prospects for adoption;

- Establish all model programs as both demonstrations of best practice and training centres for Chinese welfare institution administrators, teachers and caregivers in effective methods of nurturing care that can benefit all at risk children; and

- Expansion of support and funding in Australia for HTSA's work in China among existing networks including directors, members and individual supporters.

HTSA's long term objectives are to:

- Implement multiple model programs, training bases, mentoring relationships and training pathways within the Chinese welfare system to facilitate and support widespread and permanent adoption of Half the Sky inspired best practice models and methods of care by officials, administrators, teachers and caregivers for the long term benefit of all orphaned and disadvantaged children;

- Ultimately hand over direct responsibility for and operation of all established model programs in Chinese welfare institutions to local authorities and staff to operate as their own for the long term adoption and sustainability of Half the Sky inspired best practice programs and methods of care;

- Eventual transition from providing programs directly to children to a focus on training, coaching and mentoring within the Chinese welfare system post the hand over of model programs to local stakeholders; and

- Expansion of support and funding in Australia for HTSA's work in China in the wider public, corporate and philanthropic sectors.

Strategies

To achieve its stated objectives, HTSA has adopted the following strategies:

- A strategic and practical partnership between HTSA and Half the Sky Foundation (HTS) and its Chinese government partners at national, provincial and local levels to implement HTSA's objectives on the ground in China. China-based knowledge, networks and partnerships with stakeholders in China, especially government authorities, are critical to achieving HTSA's short term and long term objectives;

- Development and implementation of an initial joint HTSA HTS 5 year project in China for the creation and operation of a model Half the Sky Children's Centre and provincial training base at Changsha in Hunan province; working in partnership also with the local Changsha Welfare Institution and provincial stakeholders for long term sustainability of programs and training (note: based on this first project a second project was commenced from July 2014);

- In Australia, establishing its office in Melbourne, expanding communications with members and supporters including creation of a website and Annual Report, undertaking membership drives, maintaining registration as a fundraising entity in all states and the ACT and seeking Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status.

No significant change in the nature of these activities occurred during the financial year except to note the achievement of DGR status in March and the approval for commencement of a second major development project in China from July 2014.

(d) Members guarantee

Half the Sky Foundation Australia Ltd is a company limited by guarantee. If the company is wound up, the constitution states that each member is required to contribute a maximum of \$ 10 each towards meeting any outstanding obligations of the entity. At 30 June 2014, the total amount that members of the company are liable to contribute if the company is wound up is \$ 60 (2013: \$70).

2. Business review

(a) Operating results

The surplus from ordinary activities for the year amounted to \$707,461 (2013 : deficit of \$47,379).

(b) Review of operations

A review of the operations of the company during the financial year and the results of those operations show that the company continued

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to engage in its principal activities the results of which are disclosed in the financial statements.

3. Other items

(a) Significant changes in state of affairs

The company's Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status was approved in March 2014, which led to a significant increase in fundraising efforts and results in the financial year. The company also approved a second major development project in China to commence in July 2014. No other significant changes in the company's state of affairs occurred during the financial year.

(b) After balance day events

No matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the company, the results of those operations or the state of affairs of the company in future financial years.

(c) Future developments

The company expects to maintain and increase the present level of operations given the achievement of DGR status in March 2014, the appointment of Chief Development Officer from August 2014, and commencement of second major development project in China from July 2014.

(d) Environmental issues

The company's operations are not regulated by any significant environmental regulation under a law of the Commonwealth or of a state or territory.

(e) Auditors independence declaration

A copy of the auditor's independence declaration as required under section 307C of the *Corporations Act 2001* is set out at page 7.

1 Summary of significant accounting policies

(a) General information

The financial report is for Half the Sky Foundation Australia Ltd as an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Half the Sky Foundation Australia Ltd is a company limited by guarantee.

(b) Basis of preparation

Half the Sky Foundation Australia Limited applies Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements as set out in AASB 1053: *Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards* and AASB 2010–2: *Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements*.

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the *Corporations Act 2001*. The company is a not for profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

(c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

(d) Restricted / Unrestricted funds

Restricted funds are funds received or reserves held that must be spent on the purpose for which they were received or are held. They comprise of donations where the donor indicates a preference for the use of the funds and donations received in response to specific purpose appeals.

(e) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(f) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the company is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(g) Revenue and other income

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which, for floating rate financial assets, is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Donation income is recognised when received.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(h) Comparative Figures

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.
